You can find instructions in the FAQ on the portal on how to now self-report this yearly visit for yourself and your spouse/domestic partner (they must be enrolled in the Aon Active Health Exchange for medical coverage). If you had your preventive visit in December of 2014, you should already see your points reported in the portal. If you had your preventive exam since January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2015, you will need to self-report this visit for points. #### Stroke

A stroke occurs when the blood supply to part of your brain is interrupted or severely reduced and depriving the brain of oxygen and nutrients. Stroke is always an emergency as brain cells begin to die within minutes.

Symptoms may include trouble with speaking and understanding, paralysis/numbness of the face, arm or leg or trouble with seeing in one or both eyes. A sudden or severe headache or trouble with walking. Remember "FAST": Face-Does one side of the face droop when you ask the person to smile? Arms-Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift down or is one arm unable to raise up? **Speech-**Is the person's speech slurred or strange when asking them to repeat a phrase? **Time-**Call 911 immediately if you notice any of these signs. The longer it takes to receive treatment – the higher the chance of brain damage.

**Causes** A stroke may be caused by an artery that is blocked (ischemic stroke) or a leaking or bursting of a blood vessel (hemorrhagic stroke). Some people may experience only a temporary disruption of blood flow to their brain (transient ischemic attack, or TIA).

Lifestyle risk factors include being overweight or obese, physical inactivity, heavy or binge drinking, use of illicit drugs such as cocaine and methamphetamines. Medical risk factors include high blood pressure, cigarette smoking, high cholesterol, diabetes, obstructive sleep, and different forms of cardiovascular disease. Other risk factors include personal or family history of stroke, heart attack or transient ischemic attack, being age 55 or older, race (African-Americans have a higher risk), gender (men have a higher risk of stroke than women). Women may have some risk from some birth control pills or hormone therapies that include estrogen, as well as from pregnancy and childbirth.

**Complications** (permanent or temporary) Complications may include: paralysis or loss of muscle movement, difficulty talking or swallowing, memory loss or thinking difficulties, emotional problems, vision issues, breathing issues, pain, numbness or other strange sensations, changes in behavior and self-care ability. Other complications can occur.

**Treatment** for stroke depends on whether you're having an ischemic stroke blocking an artery (the most common kind) or a hemorrhagic stroke that involves bleeding into the brain. Several tests can help doctors decide on treatment. Tests include a CT, MRI, ultrasound of the carotids, cerebral angiogram, echo and blood tests.

**Ischemic stroke** Given through an IV, tissue plasminogen activator (tPA), works by dissolving the clot and improving blood flow to the part of the brain being deprived of blood flow. It's best to get this treatment within 3 hours. An endovascular procedure is done by sending a catheter to the site of the blockage in order to remove the clot.

Hemorrhagic stroke Treatment focuses on slowing down the bleeding in your brain and reducing blood pressure. Medications can be used to lower blood pressure or to slow down the bleeding. If on blood thinners, you are at risk for severe bleeding. Drugs that counteract the blood thinners may be given. Surgical treatment is sometimes used If the stroke is caused by an AVM (which is a tangle of blood vessels).
